

Laura Ashley

For more than half a century her name has been associated with classic English style but Laura Ashley was Welsh through and through. She rose from humble beginnings in a small Welsh village to become the owner of a multi-million-pound fashion and furnishings empire, with shops all over the world carrying her name.

Laura was born in 1925, in Merthyr Tydfil. She became a top British designer and was known for her traditional, Victorian-style prints on natural fabrics, which she used to create household furnishings, linens, and women's clothing. By the time of her death there were more than 220 Laura Ashley shops worldwide.

In 1953 she began her design business in her own house in Pimlico, London. She started by using silk screens to create place mats and scarves and went on to design dresses, curtains, decorative accessories, wallpaper, and tiles.

The Ashleys moved to Surrey and then, in the late 1950s, to Carno, Wales, site of what became the world headquarters of their expanding operations. Wales played a huge part in her success: her first retail outlet had opened in Machynlleth in 1961, with a factory following two years later in Carno.

Her husband Bernard Ashley handled the engineering and financial aspects of the business, and Laura created the designs, noted for their flowery, lace-covered appearances, suggestive of traditional English country manners and ways. The couple moved into retailing in 1967, with the opening of their first shop in Kensington, London. This enterprise was followed by shops all over Britain and in Canada, Australia, continental Europe and the United States.

At the age of 60 Laura had a nasty accident while visiting her daughter in the Cotswolds, in England. She slipped and fell down the stairs. She was taken to hospital but never recovered consciousness. Her company still bears her name but is now owned by a Malaysian business group called MUI.

The Tower of London

The Tower of London was founded by King William the Conqueror. After his coronation on Christmas Day, 1066, William hastily ordered the construction of a wooden fortress between the Thames and the old Roman wall which then surrounded London.

William began the building of what is now called as the White Tower ten years later. This was a rectangular stone tower, designed as an impregnable fortress and as an impressive and awesome demonstration of his power to the Londoners.

The White Tower consisted of three floors and contains the austere Norman Chapel of St. John, which remains one of the best preserved examples of a Norman chapel in England. The present castle, now covering eighteen acres grew around the Conqueror's original tower, being added to by successive generations.

Home composting made easy

Home composting is a fantastic way of turning organic garden and household waste into fabulous plant food to boost growth in your garden.

Composting is a slow, natural process that sees nature work on waste to break down organic material. It turns it into a rich, dark soil conditioner that is full of elements that are essential for helping plants and vegetables to grow.

For successful home composting you'll need to invest in a shop-bought compost bin or you can make your own. If you're handy at doing things yourself, then I suggest you get your hands on some old wooden boards for the four sides and layer the bottom of your pile with old cardboard. Cover the top with an old carpet, mat or cloth to keep in the heat and aid the composting process.

You should place your compost pile on open, bare soil or grass and somewhere which is easily accessible - even during bad weather. Learn what can and cannot be composted. You don't want to fill your bin with things that will be bad for your plants, so learn what is compostable and what isn't.

Generally all uncooked green waste is perfect. Nothing cooked and absolutely no meat should be added. Egg shells are grand but they should be smashed up as much as possible before they are deposited in your bin.

The composting process can take up to twelve months. However, it can work much faster if you insulate the pile well and use material that breaks down quickly. Cutting up your brown waste as you add it to the compost pile really helps When the compost looks dark and rich and feels evenly soft in the hand it is generally ready for use.

Aid the process by layering your pile with leaves, branches, grass cuttings, household green waste, tea bags, coffee grains and more. And if it looks like your compost pile needs a little help, add in some compost maker.

Composting time varies and will depend on the frequency of mixing, the mixture of materials used and also on weather conditions. It can be ready in as little as a few months or may take as long as 12-24 months.
